Tax Forms Available

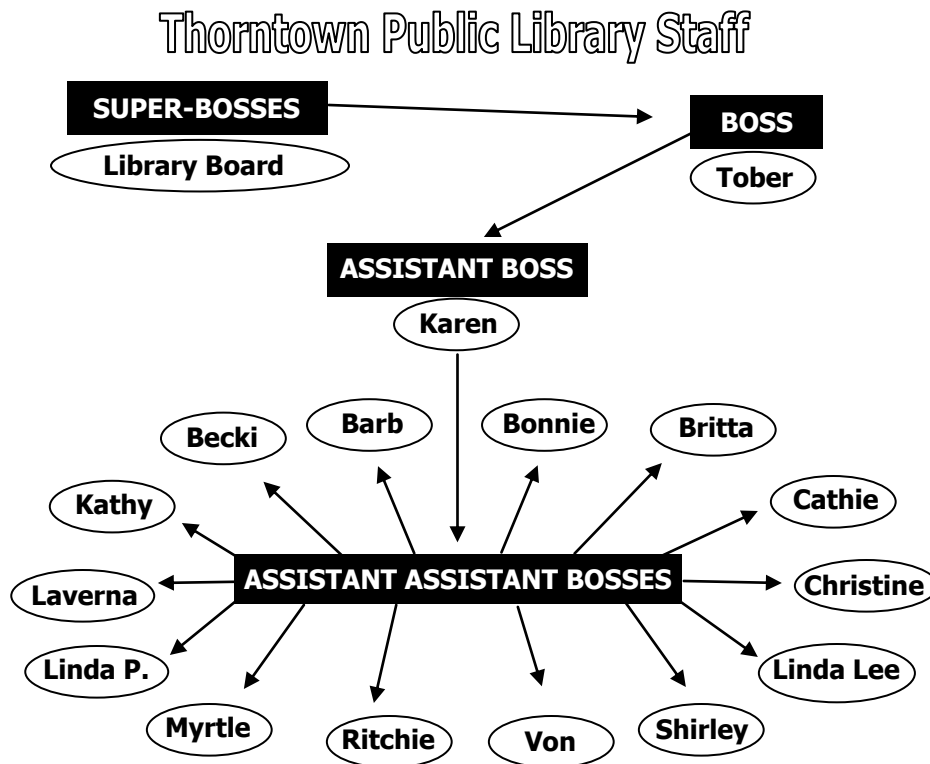
On January 1 the library is allowed to put out tax forms. That would be great, if any were to be had. As soon as they arrive, forms will be in the file crates near the desk in the local history department. Federal forms have been delayed because of changing legislation passed on December 17, 2010. State forms will arrive soon, it is hoped. Although the IRS will not be mailing tax forms to individuals this year, they will be found at the library.

State tax forms are also available online at www.in.gov/dor and federal tax forms can be found at www.irs.gov. They may be printed from the web sites for ten cents per page. Less frequently-used forms or hard-to-find federal forms will be available from a reproducible handbook and may be printed on the library's copier for ten cents per page.

Although the librarians are not allowed to answer tax questions, they will help you find the forms you need.

New Indiana E-Waste Law

According to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM), beginning in 2011, Indiana residents and businesses are prohibited from disposing of e-waste in with their standard trash collection. E-waste includes, but is not limited to, televisions, computer monitors, laptops, tablet PC, e-readers, or anything with a screen size larger than four inches measured diagonally; as well as computers, fax machines, DVD players, VCRs, keyboards and printers.
